





BENEDICTION (of the Blessed Sacrament)

Yesterday, for the first time in many years, we had a public Exposition and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament in our Blackheath Church. No one I have asked seems to know exactly when the last occasion that occurred.

Benediction is a very special liturgical practice in which those present both venerate and are themselves then blessed via the Sacramental Host "Reserved" in a monstrance designed for that purpose.

Benediction, whose meaning is "blessing", was the final prayer in this communal gathering. First, we celebrated Mass, then we shared Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament while praying the Rosary and subsequent prayerful quiet time. The Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) was available during this period. Last of all came the celebration of Benediction which included hymns, prayers, incensing and, of course, the special Blessing. Starting with the 9.00am Mass, total time taken was about one hour fifteen minutes, finishing at about 10.15am.

Given the support of those present yesterday, I propose to include Benediction on a regular scheduled basis following the 9.00am Mass on the second Saturday of every month, the next date being 8th August, the Feast of Blessed Mary MacKillop.

For those interested, Benediction evolved from a practice begun in the 14th Century, and which continued unabated until 1953 when this devotion fell out-of-favour with the introduction of Saturday evening Masses. Many of our more mature parishioners would recall with some fondness their weekly attendance at Benediction.

Human Swine Flu

Just a reminder of the changes to liturgical practices within the Mass:

- ◆ During the Sign of Peace instead of shaking hands, kissing or embracing, as is practised in some parishes, it would be best to simply nod your head and avoid bodily contact.
- ◆ When praying the Our Father do not hold hands, as may be practiced in some parishes, but simply extend hands towards heaven or fold your hands.
- ◆ Holy Communion should only be distributed under the species of the Consecrated Host AND NOT THE CHALICE to limit the spread of germs during the H1N1 epidemic.
- ◆ Prudence suggests that the reception of Holy Communion be only on the hand but with respect for the freedom which the Holy See provides in this matter.
- ◆ Holy water from the font should not be used either when entering or departing from the Church.

REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA

God chooses ordinary people and confers on them an extraordinary responsibility. Amos was a shepherd and a dresser of sycamores. Most of the apostles were fishermen. Paul was a tentmaker. Christians today are mechanics and clerks, teachers and engineers, doctors and housekeepers. These are all people following ordinary trades or professions, but what they do in them is truly remarkable. They touch minds and hearts and souls, and they heal them. They instruct and comfort people, and they help to drive out the demons that possess them. They participate in very ordinary ways in the extraordinary establishment of the reign of God.

Jesus inaugurated the reign of God on earth. He chose disciples and sent them out to continue the work that he had begun, to preach his gospel and, through healings and exorcisms, to conquer the forces of evil that threatened that reign. And now we have been called; in him we have been chosen, in all of our brokenness and vulnerability. The task to which we have been called is awe-inspiring; and every spiritual blessing in the heavens has been bestowed upon us so that we will be able to accomplish it. If we allow Christ's saving power to take possession of us, we too will further his prophetic ministry. We will bring the saving grace of God to the world that is terrified and that writhes in pain; we will bring it to those places where healing is needed and where demons still hold sway. We will bring all things under the headship of Christ.
