

Next Week: Welcome me Wisdom 2:12.17-20: Psalm 53 James 3:16-4:3: Mark 9:30-37

Faith without good deeds is guite dead—you show your faith by your deeds. These words of James today challenge us all. I once saw a sign in Chennai on a YMCA Boys' Home – To help with the hand is holier than to pray with the lips. Perhaps this is what James meant when he asked, 'What good is it to say, "I wish you well, keep warm and eat plenty", but not give them the bare necessities of life?'

Do we follow up our good intentions with action? Do we write that letter to the paper or to our local member urging action on an issue of social justice? Do we respond to the call for groceries and toiletries at our local neighbourhood house? Jesus rebukes Peter in today's gospel for not thinking as God thinks but as humans do. Jesus reminds us that if we choose to follow him we will need to give up thinking and acting as the world urges us and model our life from Daily Prayer online on the way Jesus lived.

Our Sacramental Programme - Progress Report

You will recall that way back on Pentecost Sunday at the 9.30am Mass, six candidates for initiation into the Church and its Sacramental life were introduced to you. Since then, thanks to the dedication of Heather, Michelle and Moira, steady progress has been made to impart the knowledge needed for these candidates to be inducted into the four Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Penance, Confirmation and Eucharist – their First Holy Communion).

One baptised candidate received the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Penance) for the first time after last Sunday's Mass, while last evening at St Joseph's in Megalong Valley, two candidates who live in that district, were baptised in association with that Church's normal Saturday Vigil Mass. They, in turn, will receive the Sacrament of Penance for the first time this coming Tuesday afternoon. Another (adult) candidate has successfully completed all the instruction needed for Confirmation, the only Sacrament of Initiation still outstanding for them.

A draft copy of the special Mass booklet incorporating the Sacrament of Initiation is already with the Parramatta Diocese, awaiting the required approval prior to printing for general distribution 'on the day'.

That 'day' is the 27th September when, at our normal 9.30am Mass, the principal celebrant Rev. Fr. Chris De Souza E.V. P.P., representing Bishop Kevin Manning, will lead our candidates through their initiation into full membership of the Catholic Church. The candidates are Matthew Brawn; Aaron Friend; Kate Friend; Tara Hargreaves; Taylah Keane and Connor White.

Meanwhile, I ask you to pray for each of these young people as they enter into the final couple of weeks before they take this giant step forward in the progression of their spiritual life. **God Bless! Fr Bob**
