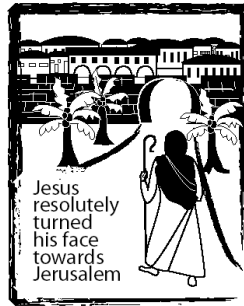

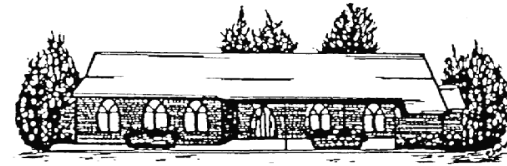

THE MASS IS CHANGING – HOW AND WHY!

A new translation of the Mass has been in preparation for the last few years. Now the translation is almost ready for use in parishes. Following are answers to common questions about the new translation of the Latin text.

Why is a new translation being prepared?

- ◆ The current translation of the Mass was prepared in 1973. This translation was quickly produced and reflects the translation philosophies of the time.
- ◆ The decades of pastoral experience that followed convinced the Holy See that the translation of the Mass could be substantially improved.
- ◆ It ordered a new translation to be produced after Pope John Paul II announced a revised edition of the Roman Missal in 2000.

What is the Roman Missal?

- ◆ The Roman Missal is one of the liturgical books of the Church. It contains the prayers that the priest says during Mass, as well as the instructions (rubrics) for what he is to do.
- ◆ The current English version is called the “Sacramentary”, but when the new translation comes out it will be called by its official name, the Roman Missal.
