SEA SUNDAY COMMEMORATION: While hardly a seaport in this mountainous region of the Blue Mountains, we nonetheless gain untold benefits from our exports of primary produce and exported finished products, also the imported manufactured goods, including food, clothing, vehicles, building materials, light and heavy industrial plant and equipment – yes, and even toys - that contribute so much to our personal comfort and quality of life. We both send to and receive from all corners of our ever-smaller world a mind-boggling array of "goodies" that we so take for granted. Shipping is the answer! Shipping is the means to this end, except for the miniscule quantity that comes to us by air.

Hence today, this one day of the year, we feature those who man the ships and make all this possible for us. To this extent, seafarers are important for our economy and our balance of payments. Seafarers are not a number. They are not a commodity. They are a crucial part of Australia competing in the global market.

In November 2012, the Pontifical Council for Migrants and Itinerant People held the 5-yearly Apostleship of the Sea World Congress at the Vatican. It encouraged all member countries to remember that during this year in which we celebrate the New Evangelisation, to not forget that seafarers are also part of our global parish. It is also important to note that the Apostleship of the Sea is the Catholic Church's evangelisation response to both male and female seafarers working on vessels throughout the world. Should you wish to support these otherwise voiceless people to return to them a little of the quality of life they make possible for us, please give freely on a leaving collection at the end of today' Mass. Thank you in advance for your support.

A FEW THOUGHTS FROM OUR BISHOP: In a recent communication with his priests, Bishop Anthony made several comments in relation to the canonization of our two new pope Saints – John XXIII and John Paul II. I quote..."I was privileged to concelebrate with Pope Francis, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, 800 bishops and a million of the faithful the canonisation Mass for St John XXIII and St John Paul II, the two most famous priests of the 20th Century. The two new saints were widely dubbed 'the bookends of the Second Vatican Council' and their canonisations as the 'canonisation of the Council' because Good Pope John instigated it in 1959 and John Paul the Great was its great interpreter.

To see the canonisations only in these terms, however, risks missing the crucial point about this and every other canonisation: that here the Church was recognising heroic virtue, great holiness, communion with God on earth and in heaven and calling us to imitation. For priests, it is particularly important that these men were priests – shepherds of souls whose eye was always to their flocks, whether these were parishes, university chaplaincies, archdioceses, or the universal Church."

NEW APPOINTMENT: Last weekend, Father John McSweeney (who is well known to us as a past Blue Mountains' Dean), and who has just recovered from a stroke earlier this year, has been appointed Parish Priest of the massive Glenwood/Stanhope Gardens Parish to replace the recently deceased classmate of mine – Father Dave Hume. We wish Fr John every success in his new appointment and congratulate him on that appointment.

SUNDRY: Tuesday next (16/7) is the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

Finally, in the presence of serious illness in our midst at this time, I ask you to pray for the welfare and healing of everyone so afflicted.
