

THE YEAR OF THE PRIEST: 2009-2010

Pope Benedict XVI recently declared a year-long celebration of one of the most basic and fundamental elements of the Catholic Church: the priesthood.

Beginning June 19 just passed (Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus), our Church will dedicate one full year to remembering what it is to be a priest. This will not only be an opportunity for us priests to rediscover our vocation. mission and passion for Christ, but it also gives parishioners a chance to rediscover the gifts (benefits) the priesthood is for your own lives.

The Pontiff chose this year to reflect on priests because this is also the 150th anniversary of the death of St John Vianney, known as the Cure d'Ars. By linking the Year for Priests with St John Vianney, who is also the patron of Diocesan priests, this jubilee not only celebrates the basics of the Church, but also the basics of the priesthood itself.

The road to priesthood was difficult for John Vianney who had difficulty even learning to read, write and learn Latin. Nine vears after he began his priesthood studies, the student Vianney was finally ordained at age 29 years. Less than three years later he was assigned as assistant pastor in the small country village of Ars, not far from Lyons. Eventually, he re-awakened the faith of his parishioners through his preaching, prayers and way of life. His reputation slowly grew until, spending up to 18 hours a day in the confessional, Fr Vianney was confessing up to 80,000 penitents a year. Exhausted, the Cure D'Ars died August 4, 1859 aged 73 years.

St John Vianney was a "tireless worker for God", a sentiment expressed by Pope John XXIII and symbolic of every one of the world's 408,000 priests, and that is one priest for every 2,810 Catholics in the world.

Pope John XXIII stated "The priesthood is the love of the heart of Jesus. When you see the priest, think of our Lord Jesus Christ." This year we have the opportunity to do just that. God Bless! Fr Bob

In the gospel, Jesus reaches deep into the world beyond life and rescues a young girl from the jaws of death. Earlier, he was jostled by the crowd and felt healing power leave him in order to restore an afflicted woman. Repeating the words of last week's gospel: Who is this man? Is this someone with whom we want to become involved? On the other hand, can we afford not to get involved with him? This is a man who can lead us to life even in the midst of death. He is someone who is interested in the well-being of everyone, even those who may not be highly valued by society – women and children, the chronically ill, those who carry the seeds of death within them.

God's graciousness toward us should prompt us to be generous toward others. What we receive as life-enhancing gifts, we must share with those in need, those to whom life has not been kind. As we have been favoured by the healing touch of God, so we must extend that same loving touch to others. The love of Christ impels us to be open-handed as we approach those in need. Following Jesus' lead, we must not only give to them, we must also allow them to take from us. At times this will require that we share material resources; at other times it might mean that our energy will be drained in our service of them. In all of this, Jesus has set the example for us to follow.
