

JOURNEY OF LIFE Walking the ancient pilgrim Way through France to Compostella follows a route that avoids main roads where possible. That means that it takes the paths of goats and of waterfalls. Sometimes it's very steep, rocky, and wet... in a word, impractical for someone my age! Many follow and complain, others don't complain but give up, others still take it all in and go as if it was 'the only way', almost 'the God-given Way'. But this isn't so. The historical way was in the best possible position and went through villages. Over the years those roads have been sealed. I don't feel bad taking the roads instead of the paths and staying in one piece. Nevertheless, I had my share of paths, stones and water.

The stages were shorter than last year, between fifteen and twenty-five kilometres, but much harder because of climbing up and down. It's the hardest part of the whole Way to Compostella. From here on it will be almost flat until the Pyrénées.

Walking the Way is not at all like a school excursion. Each person starts when they want, goes at their own speed, eats, stops, takes photos when they want. There is always someone ahead of you and someone behind. Some make friends and form a small group, some like me just talk with the one who is overtaking and say I am walking slowly, go your way. In the evening we meet those who have chosen the same arrangements to sleep and eat. Sometimes we meet 'soul' brothers or sisters, then in the morning we start alone again.

Walking the Way mirrors the journey of life, reflecting important lessons...

The Way forms us...

- 1. **We walk our way alone**. No one can walk it for us. We have to be determined to go on and reach the end, conscious of the dangers and difficulties, of our pack, our feet, our strength, our goal.
- 2. The Way reveals our true self. Here there are no roles anymore. We are all pilgrims; we all look the same, shoes, hats, backpacks. No one is more learned, intelligent, or experienced than another. We have a task that we have taken freely on ourselves and we do our best to accomplish it. No one judges us or our performance.
- 3. One learns to be tolerant and welcoming of others. Our motivations, our goals, our ways, our short cuts, our detours are our own.
- 4. There are no written laws, not even the obligation to walk. But there is a feeling of belonging to a people in movement towards a goal. People walk for many reasons: for sport, pleasure, as a retirement project, to forget, to decide, to heal oneself or others. There is comfort in hearing others' stories.
- 5. **Never give advice!** You can just say what works for you if you are asked. (Monique)

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
